Regional Spotlights

SOUTHWESTERN

Contemplative Outreach Southwestern Ontario (SWOCCO) has had a very busy fall this year. After a summer break for most of the Centering Prayer groups, we resumed our regular meetings in September. It was a happy re-union for all!

* In September we held an Introductory Workshop at Elmwood Presbyterian Church in London. Jan Evans, the facilitator, writes: "On September 24, 2016, the Centering Prayer group that meets at Elmwood Presbyterian Church in London hosted an Introductory Workshop. The Southwest regional team provided facilitation for the day. We were thrilled with the response we got – 32 people attended the workshop and a number of others had to cancel last minute. The participants came from across London and surrounding counties. I was thrilled to see a wide representation of faith backgrounds – Anglican, Presbyterian, United, Evangelical, Amish, Baptist, Catholic and "Nones," as well as seeing a 30-80 year old age range. I heard many enthusiastic responses following the day. People loved the presentations and enjoyed the opportunity to practice silent prayer in community.

There were 15 people who indicated they are interested in attending follow-up sessions or forming a Centering Prayer group in their church. We are still in the process of figuring out how that might be coordinated and supported. Clearly, there is a deep hunger in the hearts of many people in this region to understand and experience contemplative prayer. May we continue the work of feeding the hungry!!"

* On the October 15-16 weekend, Debbie Wilson-Safa, SWOCCO facilitator formation volunteer, writes: "SWOCCO was well represented at the Facilitator Formation workshop held in Toronto, by Janet Barraco (Kingsville), Jim and Pearl Clarke (Chatham), Herm Van Ryn and Lynn Prentice (London), and Debbie Wilson-Safa (Leamington).

It was a privilege to be in the company of others who make Centering Prayer a part of their daily spiritual discipline and to share in their journeys. We were blessed to have Nestor de Armas and Bob Mischke (from the United States) lead us over the two days as they enlightened us with their wisdom, stories and humour. The time together felt much like an intimate gathering with good friends sitting around the dining table. The level and depth of sharing was so grace-filled and fuelled by the presence of Holy Spirit. Janet has this to add to our time together, 'I felt very welcomed by all of them... like having our

own family that truly like our presence. It was a good bonding experience for our Ontario groups.'

The knowledge, tools and support that we left with are truly a valuable resource to enrich each of our lives and our practice of Centering Prayer. This will manifest in us how we relate and share with others in our groups, and with all those we connect with in our daily lives as we learn to listen at a deeper level of understanding. Through our roles as servant-leaders we must continue to model by example, by being present, respectful and open to the Spirit."

* On October 18, 2016 we had our fall meetings of both the Facilitators and of the Service Team which were held in Chatham. We welcomed two new members from London to the facilitators group: Norm Hobbs and Don Irvine.

The highlights included:

- Reports from events since our last meeting followed by sharing and discussion by the group.
- The decision to launch our own SWOCCO website. Debbie Wilson-Safa would be responsible for its launching as soon as possible. If you have an interest in helping with this task, please feel free to contact her.
- Marlene Kelly-Kolotylo announced her resignation as coordinator of SWOCCO effective June 30, 2017.

At the "Second Wind" Conference in Niagara Falls, it was decided that the three regions of Ontario form Contemplative Outreach Ontario to better coordinate the services to respond to the common needs of the three regions. The three coordinators were asked to take on that task. After a time of discernment, I feel at this stage of my life, it is necessary to resign as coordinator of SWOCCO. It is also time to allow new energy and abilities to flourish in the network with the privilege and opportunity of giving back to the network.

- * On October 22, 2016, an Introductory Workshop was held at St. John's Anglican Church in Leamington with 21 people in attendance. The follow-up sessions are planned for those who are interested in knowing more. We expect these sessions will be completed at the end of November and that a new Centering Prayer group will be formed in Leamington.
- * In the week of November 13, Marlene and Father Joe sent a letter to each member of the SWOCCO network through the facilitator of each group. It included a request to reflect on the importance of the gift of Centering Prayer in the lives of each of us and to discern in our hearts whether we are being called to share the gift at this time in our lives in a leadership role such as coordinator or as a servant-leader in some capacity in the near future for a term of three years. We were invited to join in prayer for this intention the first week of Advent (November 27 to December 3) in our Centering Prayer in private and in our group meetings. Submission of names of those who are feeling called is requested by December 15, 2017.

Sitting in a circle, shaded by old trees, we sipped ice-cold lemonade and shared our thoughts and personal experiences. Often, we take each other at face value, never realizing what fascinating 'back stories' we have and that no two journeys are alike. We were born in places like England, Ireland, France, New York and Canada, and our travels took us to such varied places as New Zealand, Africa and the Arctic Circle. We re-discovered that we are all open-ended books and all our journeys are unique. What circuitous routes we took to arrive here in Beeton, at this house, in this yard, at this extraordinary time, and what a blessing it was. The meeting was concluded with a Centering sit and we left hoping there may be many happy returns of this special day."

Then we put all our energy into preparing a very special Facilitators Formation Weekend (two levels) on October 15-16, 2016 with Nestor de Armas, a member of the Contemplative Outreach Facilitator Formation Leadership Team, and his friend Bob Mischke, both from the United States. Over the two days, we had 24 attendees, including six from the Southwestern region. Level 1 aimed at empowering facilitators to provide basic skills training locally to new members. Level 2 was to explore two topics in greater depth, namely Soul-friending and Twelve Principles of Spiritual Leadership. It was extremely inspiring and enriching.

St. Isaac of Syria (VIth century) On The Work of the Spirit

A person is deemed worthy of constant prayer once he has become a dwelling-place of the Spirit. For, unless someone has received the gift of the Comforter, in all certainty he will not be able to accomplish this constant prayer in quiet. But once the Spirit dwells in someone, as the Apostle says, the Spirit never ceases but prays continuously: then whether he sleeps or wakes, prayer is never absent from that person's soul.

If he eats or drinks, goes to sleep or is active; yes, even if he is sunk in deep sleep, the sweet fragrance of prayer effortlessly breathes in his heart. Then he is in the possession of prayer that knows no limit. For at all times, even when he is outwardly still, prayer constantly ministers within him secretly.

The silence of the serene is prayer, as one of those clothed in Christ says, for their thoughts are divine stirrings. The stirring of a pure mind constitutes still utterances, by means of which such people sing in a hidden way to the hidden God.
